


Agricultural Hand Signals Safety Training Program



Goal

The goal of this training program is to ensure agricultural personnel are trained in the use of standardized hand signals when working around farm machinery.

Objectives


Personnel will demonstrate the ability to use these standardized hand signals to communicate when noise or distance makes normal voice communications impossible.

Background


These standardized hand signals were proposed by the Tractor and Machinery Committee of the National Institute for Farm Safety. They were approved by the American Society of Agricultural Engineering (ASAE) in 1972 and adopted by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) in 1982. Now known as the Agricultural Hand Signals Standard (ANSI/ASAE S351), these hand signals were reaffirmed in 2022.

Hand signals

Stop the engine.
 Move your right arm across your neck from left to right in a "throat-cutting" motion.




• Start the engine.




Speed it up.
Raise your hand
to your shoulder,
close your fist, and
thrust your fist
upward to the full
extent of the arm
and back to the
shoulder rapidly
several times.

• Slow it down OR decrease the speed.

Extend an arm horizontally sideways, palm down, and wave the arm downward at least 45 degrees several times. Keep the arm straight. Do not move the arm above the horizontal position.



• Stop.



Raise equipment.
 Point upward with your forefinger while making a circle overhead with



Lower equipment.

Point toward the ground with the forefinger of one of your hands while moving the hand in a circular motion.



• This far to go.

Put your hands in front of your face, palms facing each other. Move your hands together or further apart to indicate how far to go.




Come to me OR come help me.

Raise your arm vertically




Move out OR take off.

Face the desired direction of movement, extend an arm straight out behind you, then swing it overhead and forward until it is straight out in front of you with your palm down.



Move toward me OR follow me.

Look toward the person or vehicle you want moved. Hold one hand in front of you, palm facing you. Move your forearm back and forth.
