General remarks and official action taken:

This is a consent order with New Hampshire Insurance Company (New Hampshire). The commissioner of the Texas Department of Insurance, Division of Workers' Compensation (DWC) considers whether DWC should take disciplinary action against New Hampshire.

Waiver

New Hampshire acknowledges that the Texas Labor Code and other applicable laws provide certain rights. New Hampshire waives all of these rights, and any other procedural rights that apply, in consideration of the entry of this consent order.

Findings of Fact

1. New Hampshire holds a certificate of authority issued by the Texas Department of Insurance to transact the business of insurance pursuant to TEX. INS. CODE §§ 801.051-801.053 and is licensed to write workers' compensation/employers' liability insurance.

2. New Hampshire was classified as "poor" tier in the 2007 Performance Based Oversight (PBO) assessment. New Hampshire was classified as "average" tier in the 2009, 2010, 2012, 2014, 2016, and 2018 PBO assessments.

Failure to Comply with a DWC Order

3. On [REDACTED], New Hampshire received Amended Medical Fee Dispute Resolution Findings and Decision Order No. [REDACTED].
4. This order required New Hampshire to pay [REDACTED] plus accrued interest within 30 days of receiving the order. In this case, the deadline to pay was [REDACTED]. The order found, among other things, that New Hampshire was the proper insurance carrier for this claim and waived any issues of completeness and any other newly raised defenses.
5. On [REDACTED], New Hampshire issued payment, which was 227 days late.
6. On [REDACTED], American Zurich Insurance Company reimbursed New Hampshire for the payment and accrued interest.
7. The third-party administrator for this claim is [REDACTED].

Assessment of Sanction

1. Failure to timely comply with DWC orders for payment of medical bills is not cost-effective and is harmful to injured employees and the Texas workers' compensation system.
2. In assessing the sanction for this case, DWC fully considered the following factors in TEX. LAB. CODE § 415.021(c) and 28 TEX. ADMIN. CODE § 180.26(e):
 - the seriousness of the violation, including the nature, circumstances, consequences, extent, and gravity of the prohibited act;
 - the history and extent of previous administrative violations;
 - the violator's demonstration of good faith, including actions it took to rectify the consequences of the prohibited act;
 - the penalty necessary to deter future violations;
 - whether the administrative violation had a negative impact on the delivery of benefits to an injured employee;

- the history of compliance with electronic data interchange requirements;
 - to the extent reasonable, the economic benefit resulting from the prohibited act; and
 - other matters that justice may require, including, but not limited to:
 - PBO assessments;
 - prompt and earnest actions to prevent future violations;
 - self-report of the violation;
 - the size of the company or practice;
 - the effect of a sanction on the availability of health care; and
 - evidence of heightened awareness of the legal duty to comply with the Texas Workers' Compensation Act and DWC rules.
3. DWC found the following factors in TEX. LAB. CODE § 415.021(c) and 28 TEX. ADMIN. CODE § 180.26(e) to be aggravating: the seriousness of the violation, including the nature, circumstances, consequences, extent, and gravity of the prohibited act; the history and extent of previous administrative violations; the penalty necessary to deter future violations; and whether the administrative violation had a negative impact on the delivery of benefits to an injured employee.
4. DWC found the following factors in TEX. LAB. CODE § 415.021(c) and 28 TEX. ADMIN. CODE § 180.26(e) to be mitigating: other matters that justice may require, including, but not limited to New Hampshire's actual role in the claim and the circumstances surrounding the Amended Medical Fee Dispute Resolution Findings and Decision Order.
5. New Hampshire acknowledges it communicated with DWC about the relevant statutes and rules it violated; the facts establish that the administrative violation occurred; and the proposed sanction is appropriate, including the factors DWC considered under TEX. LAB. CODE § 415.021(c) and 28 TEX. ADMIN. CODE § 180.26(e).
6. New Hampshire acknowledges that, in assessing the sanction, DWC considered the factors in TEX. LAB. CODE § 415.021(c) and 28 TEX. ADMIN. CODE § 180.26(e).

Conclusions of Law

1. The commissioner has jurisdiction over this matter pursuant to TEX. LAB. CODE §§ 402.001, 402.00114, 402.00116, 402.00128, and 414.002.

2. The commissioner has the authority to dispose of this case informally pursuant to TEX. GOV'T CODE § 2001.056, TEX. LAB. CODE §§ 401.021 and 402.00128(b)(7), and 28 TEX. ADMIN. CODE § 180.26(h).
3. New Hampshire has knowingly and voluntarily waived all procedural rights to which it may have been entitled regarding the entry of this order, including, but not limited to, issuance and service of notice of intent to institute disciplinary action, notice of hearing, a public hearing, a proposal for decision, a rehearing by the commissioner, and judicial review.
4. Pursuant to TEX. LAB. CODE § 415.021, the commissioner may assess an administrative penalty against a person who commits an administrative violation.
5. Pursuant to TEX. LAB. CODE § 415.002(a)(17), an insurance carrier or its representative commits an administrative violation if it fails to pay an order awarding benefits.
6. Pursuant to TEX. LAB. CODE § 415.002(a)(20), an insurance carrier or its representative commits an administrative violation each time it violates a DWC rule.
7. Pursuant to TEX. LAB. CODE § 415.002(a)(22), an insurance carrier or its representative commits an administrative violation each time it fails to comply with a provision of the Texas Workers' Compensation Act.
8. Pursuant to TEX. LAB. CODE §§ 415.021(a) and 415.0035(e), an insurance carrier commits an administrative violation if it violates, fails to comply with, or refuses to comply with a DWC order.
9. New Hampshire violated TEX. LAB. CODE §§ 415.021(a) and 415.0035(e) when it failed to comply with a DWC order.

Order

It is ordered that New Hampshire Insurance Company must pay an administrative penalty of \$6,000 within 30 days from the date of this order. New Hampshire Insurance Company must pay the administrative penalty by cashier's check or money order and make it payable to the "State of Texas." Mail the administrative penalty to the Texas Department of Insurance, Attn: DWC Enforcement Section, MC 9999, P.O. Box 149104, Austin, Texas 78714-9104.
