NOTICE OF INDEPENDENT REVIEW DECISION

August 5, 2002

Re: IRO Case # M2-02-0882-01

Texas Worker's Compensation Commission:

___ has been certified as an independent review organization (IRO) and has been authorized to perform independent reviews of medical necessity for the Texas Worker's Compensation Commission (TWCC). Texas HB. 2600, Rule133.308 effective January 1, 2002, allows a claimant or provider who has received an adverse medical necessity determination from a carrier's internal process, to request an independent review by an IRO.

In accordance with the requirement that TWCC assign cases to certified IRO's, TWCC assigned this case to ___ for an independent review. ___ has performed an independent review of the proposed care to determine if the adverse determination was appropriate. For that purpose, ___ received relevant medical records, any documents obtained from parties in making the adverse determination, and any other documents and/or written information submitted in support of the appeal.

The case was reviewed by a physician who is Board Certified in Neurological Surgery. He or she has signed a certification statement attesting that no known conflicts of interest exist between him or her and any of the treating physicians or providers, or any of the physicians or providers who reviewed the case for a determination prior to referral to ___ for independent review. In addition, the certification statement further attests that the review was performed without bias for or against the carrier, medical provider, or any other party to this case.

The ___ reviewer who reviewed this case has determined that, based on the medical records provided, the requested treatment is not medically necessary. Therefore, ___ agrees with the adverse determination regarding this case. The reviewer's decision and the specific reasons for it, is as follows:

History

This case involves a now 44-year-old male who was injured ___ while repairing a vacuum cleaner, and developed neck and left upper extremity pain. Heat and chiropractic treatment were pursued without help, and pain developed in the interscapular region also. After an unusually long period of conservative management without help, and MRI was performed on 8/24/01. The MRI showed a "small" central disk herniation at C5-6 without evidence of nerve root or spinal cord compression. The patient started a Work Hardening Program after the MRI was performed, indicating that there was not concern about the MRI findings being potentially disabling. The patient had a left ulner nerve transplantation in June, 2001. There was no record of traction for the neck, and no objective neurological evidence of spinal cord compression or nerve root pressure.

Requested Service

C5-6 Discectomy

Decision

I agree with the carrier's decision to deny the requested procedure.

Rationale

More conservative management, including cervical spine traction is indicated. Under the present circumstances, the possibility of proposed surgery failing is so great that to subject this patient to a major operative procedure, which in addition to not relieving his problem, brings with it significant risk of complications is not indicated.

This medical necessity decision by an Independent Review Organization is deemed to be a Commission decision and order.

YOUR RIGHT TO REQUEST A HEARING

Either party to this medical dispute may disagree with all or part of the decision and has a right to request a hearing.

If disputing a spinal surgery prospective decision, a request for a hearing must be in writing, and it must be received by the TWCC Chief Clerk of Proceedings within **10** (ten) days of your receipt of this decision (28 Tex. Admin. Code 142.5(c)).

If disputing other prospective medical necessity (preauthorization) decisions, a request for a hearing must be in writing, and it must be received by the TWCC Chief Clerk of Proceedings within **20** (twenty) days of your receipt of this decision (28 Tex. Admin. Code 148.3).

This decision is deemed received by you 5 (five) days after it was mailed (28 Tex. Admin. Code 102.4(h) or 102.5(d)). A request for a hearing should be sent to:

The party appealing this decision shall deliver a copy of its written request for a hearing to all other parties involved in the dispute (Commission Rule 133.308(t)(2)).
